It will be seen that a large number of the plants are the same as are found in the South-eastern Moluccas and the Admiralty Islands, and many of the names stand as synonyms in this work. Very few of the species described as new from these islands by Gaudichaud, Presl, De Candolle, and others, are represented by authenticated specimens in the London Herbaria, therefore we are unable to estimate the endemic element; but, so far as the flora is known, this element is limited to species.

<sup>2</sup> "Sida maura, Link," does not occur in the work cited by Endlicher, nor do we find it elsewhere. Probably it should have been *Sida mauritiana*, a synonym of *Abutilon indicum*, which is very widely dispersed in the tropics of the Old World.
